Plot synopsis

Four distinct groups approach a single, technology-centric project to resolve a (non-digital) divide which has emerged. The project aims to give students access to better educational resources through use of the Internet. When completed, it would permit the submission of work to experienced markers of a particular subject, with the aim being a resolution in any disparity of teaching quality state-wide.

Technologists, students, teachers and entrepreneurs all have a different take on the progression of the project, and split ambition for such an enterprise ultimately results in its demise. Technology (and their interest group) are seen to dominate, along with financial concerns (and its corresponding interest group), and the project ultimately fails.

Correct spelling: Cassivellaunus - "...the first British individual known to history."

Cassivellanunus attempts to repel Caesar's second invasion of Britain, through the use of harrying tactics (such as submerged spikes in the Thames river) and, when the Romans advanced beyond fortified territory, with the release of much of his army and the adoption of guerilla-style techniques. Cassivellanunus was forced into hiding, and the surrender of five other British tribes permitted Caesar to learn of his location. Subsequently, Cassivellanunus was besieged and eventually surrendered upon learning that his territories had been defeated and devastated.

Cassivellanunus is the entrepreneur, whose tactics are ultimately seen to fail and result in the demise of the project.
